Sutter Creek Elementary School consists of two campuses: the Primary campus for kindergarten through second grade and the Upper campus for third grade through sixth grade.

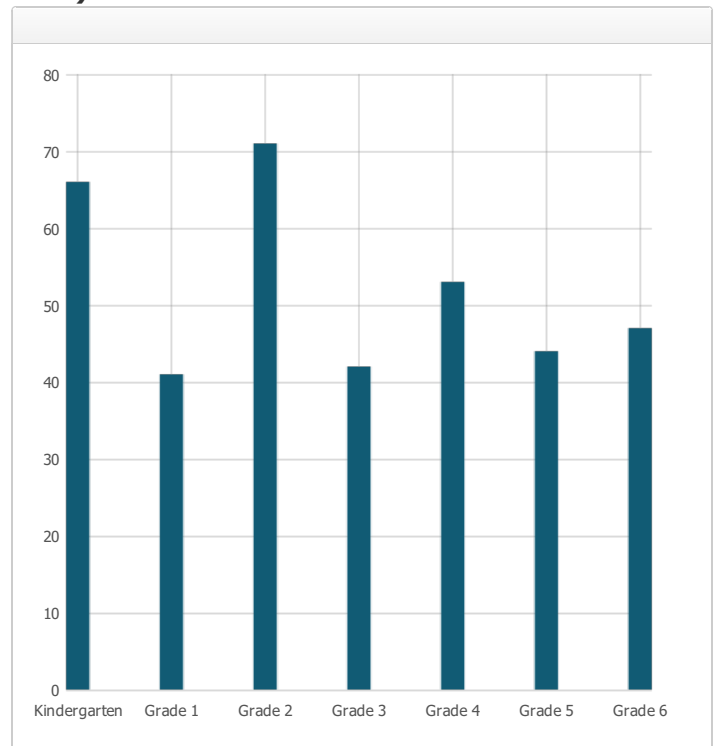

Professional Development

In the 16/17 school year, we had a total of 4.5 days in the Amador County Schools calendar set aside for professional development and continuous professional growth. The areas of focus for these 4.5 days were selected using student achievement data, teacher surveys, needs determined by our Single Plans for Student Achievement, the new Common Core Standards, our instructional leadership team feedback, and implementation strategies thereof, as well as results

from Response to Intervention classwork.

Professional development is delivered via after-school workshops, summer institutes, release days and conference attendance – along with individual teacher mentoring. Teachers are supported through these processes with in-class coaching, teacher/principal coaching, and discussions with a focus on our project-based minimum days. Our district has a current focus on math, NGSS, literacy, and using high-leverage strategies.
